150 WOMEN

Will Come to Albany to the Missionary Convention.

The national missionary convention of the United Presbyterian church to be held in Albany beginning Monday evening, June 5 and ending Thursday morning June 8, will be an important gathering of women from different parts of the country from New York and Pennsylvania West. There will be approximately one hundred fifty women here from other places, mostly delegates. About one hundred of them will arrive in Portland Friday evening, June 2. They will remain there over night and come to Albany on the noon train of Saturday, June 3 and be entertained by our citizens until their departure. Some are already visiting on the coast and those from the coast churches will make up the total of one hundred fifty or more. The gathering will be a good thing for Oregon.

The Woman's Missionary Society is made up of 26,575 members, representing 1,019 congregational societies. Last year they raised \$121,000, and closed the year with a balance of \$16,000 on hand. They are among their other work supporting 45 women missionaries and five lady physicians. Besides they are looking after a good deal of home work. Among the delegates will be nine women missionaries, now in this country.

THE WAR.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 26.—News of a successful cavalry raid by Lieutenant-General Mitchenko: On the return journey the Russians dispersed several bands of Chinese bandits. The prisoners taken number officers and 234 men.

More Rioting.

CHICAGO, May 26.—Rioting broke out afresh today in the teamsters strike and, although nobody was seriously hurt, there was a number of vicious fights in the lumber district, during which the police were compelled to use their clubs, and in one instance revolvers, in order to disperse the mob.

PORTLAND, May 26.—The long-expected announcement has at last come that construction on the Lewiston-Riparian branch of the O. R. & N. and on the Lewiston-Grangeville line of the Northern Pacific will be begun at once and hurried through to completion as rapidly as possible.

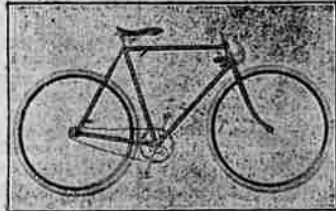

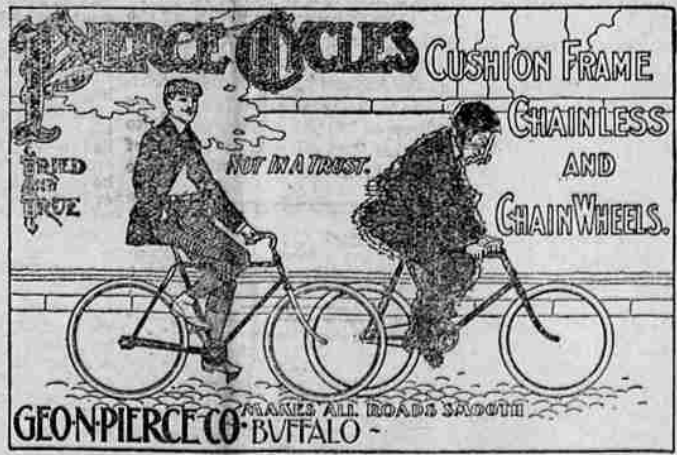
