A round Heppner.

Heppner, Or., June 4, '05.  
No doubt you have read the account of the water spout which struck near Rhea Creek about 10 miles from Heppner, on the Hardman stage road May 30, in which four persons lost their lives and were buried here on June 1. About 1:30 o'clock when the citizens of Heppner were forming to march to the cemetery to hold Decoration services, a threatening cloud was gathering to the south and was closely watched by the people of Heppner, and as it seemed to be moving slowly toward Heppner from the same direction that the cloud of two years ago did, the people hesitated in preparations for marching to the cemetery, and continued to watch the approaching cloud, when it divided and went to the East and West of Heppner and only rained a little, not enough to lay the dust, but enough to stop all Decoration exercises. A few minutes later while the sun was shining brightly a phone from Rhea Creek was received announcing a water spout or cloud burst near there in Caisson Canyon, the rain and hail being several feet deep, and the drowning of Mrs. Nimimaker and two daughters and a daughter of Mr. Cox. In a few minutes Heppner was the scene of great excitement and every team and saddle horse that could be secured was soon on the road to the scene of the disaster. In a short time at least 200 people had arrived at the mouth of the canyon, and a search commenced to recover the bodies. Soon a phone was received at Heppner to send a load of shovels, picks and axes. Two of the bodies were found that evening three miles below the canyon and the next morning the other two were found near where the others were. Some of the bodies were covered in three or four feet of hail, the hail being from three to six feet deep in places.  
The Nimimaker home is located at the mouth of Caisson Canyon, and near the bridge that crosses Rhea Creek. Just above the house the canyon forms two channels, one running on each side of the house. The family was watching the canyon from their parlor, with their wraps on, some 12 persons, and when they saw the terrible wave 8 or 12 feet high they made a rush for the hill, but in order to reach the bridge between them and the hill they were obliged to cross in front of the wave. Some of them reached the bridge, while seven or eight of them were caught by the water. Four failed to get out. The others were badly bruised before getting out. It looked to them while on the porch that the wave would surely strike the house, which caused them to make a dash for the hills, but it divided before reaching the house and went on each side of it and did not strike the house at all. If they had stayed in the house they would all have been saved. But no one can tell where these terrible spouts are going to strike.  
On the same evening a small spout struck black Horse Canyon about six miles below Heppner and came out into Willow Creek and washed out 17 rail lengths of the R. R. and covered up quite a lot of track so we were cut off from train service for 48 hours.  
Such reports as the Oregonian published about the loss of stock and property on Rhea Creek should be suppressed, as nothing was lost except the four persons. Also a report in that paper that a spout had occurred three miles above Heppner and the loss could not be obtained. Nothing of the kind happened.  
A man here telephoned to Dallas where he used to live that there was a cloud burst in Heppner but he was saved. Yet it did not rain enough here to lay the dust. The lady in the central phone office here phoned to her folks in The Dalles that there had been a cloudburst and lots of people drowned. Heppner and vicinity have had sad experiences in the line of water spouts

and the people have suffered enough reality without having to suffer from false reports.

Having been in this vicinity and knowing the facts and having been an eye witness to two water spouts when life seemed to hang by a brittle thread and helping for two days to gather up the dead, I know the truth is bad enough.

The writer will always try and give the DEMOCRAT readers as correct a report of any water spout in or near here, should any more swing around this way but hopes he may never have another occasion to witness one or ever hear of one.

During the last two weeks there have been 8 or 10 train loads of sheep shipped from Heppner to Wyoming and Montana. They build dipping vats here. They are about 60 feet long and just wide enough for a sheep to pass through and deep enough to swim them. They drive them in at one end and they swim the length of the vat and men stand on each side and with dipping hooks ducks them 3 or 4 times before they get out on a standing floor to drain the dipping fluid off of them and it flows back into the vat. The fluid is heated to a certain degree and kept that way. They dip about 6000 a day at 3 cts per head. All sheep are required to be dipped before they are allowed in the stock yards or loaded on the cars. There have been sixty or seventy thousand dipped up to this time.

The ware houses here are all chuck full of wool which is being shipped out as fast as they can bale it and load it on the cars. Four, six and eight horse teams can be seen all day passing along the streets to the ware houses loaded with wool and returning to the interior loaded with freight for the interior towns.

Hoping to meet you all on the Trail I will choke off.

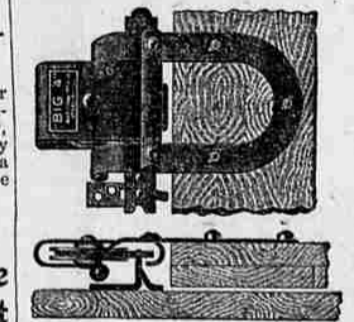
