**Tenth Trans-Continental Trip.**

(Concluded from yesterday.)  
The principal cities passed through between New Orleans and Washington were Mobile, Montgomery, Atlanta and Richmond. The country in this part of the journey has more to interest a man who was brought up on a farm than that travelled over between Los Angeles and New Orleans; but the evidence of want of enterprise and of high-grade farming is everywhere manifest. All the farmers seem to be colored men, and more than one ocular demonstration was given of the fact that they were far from being experts. More than one put in his appearance, plowing, as he thought, with a single mule, but he was not plowing at all. He was only scratching the ground, as some who call themselves farmers do in Oregon; and I suppose that he, like the Oregonian, would be indignant at a college professor's presumption in expressing his opinion in regard to that of which he is supposed to know nothing.

After an interval of 42 years I found myself in Washington City, D. C., where I spent the Sabbath and Monday till 5:30 p. m. Since my last visit the city has grown and new places of interest have been erected. One of the first of these visited was Washington's Monument, and obelisk 555 feet and 5-1-8 inches in height. It was begun by private subscription and was completed by an appropriation made by an act of Congress. The corner stone was laid in 1848. In 1855 the shaft had reached a height of 152 feet. The work which was at that time suspended was resumed in 1878, and the monument was completed in 1885. Robert C. Winthrop, who delivered the address at the laying of the corner stone in 1848, was the orator at the dedication, Feb. 21st, 1885. The total cost was \$1,300,000.

Within the Monument is an elevator by which visitors are carried to the height of 504 feet. At this point are openings in the walls from which there is a splendid view of the whole city of Washington and much of the surrounding country, including the mountains of Virginia and a part of Maryland.

Some of the other interesting places visited were the Agricultural Building, Smithsonian Institute, Museum and Congressional Library. Of these I will not attempt a description. I will merely say that the Congressional Library is one of the finest and most completely furnished buildings that I ever saw. To be appreciated it must be seen. No attempt at description can give the faintest conception of reality.

One of the first things that attracted my attention in the Capital City of our great country was the number of females, young and old, large and small, beautiful and otherwise, seen on the streets and elsewhere, many of whom manifestly "had boy-on-the-brain" and were candidates for matrimony. A young man who accompanied me in some of my perambulations told me that 67 per cent of the population of the city are females. He also informed me that no less than three young ladies had "proposed" to him, although he has been a resident of the city less than a year and has not made the acquaintance of very many young ladies. Whether these proposals had been made during leap-year or not, he did not inform me; but I am inclined to think they were not. He did inform me, however, that the proposals were not made as men usually make them, but after the manner of women.

At 5:30 Monday afternoon, I left Washington on the B. and O. train for New Concord, Ohio, 378 miles distant, and the next day my trip of 4628 miles came to a punctum stans. The whole distance was traveled without a mishap of any kind, and I am glad that I came as I did. The most of the trip was through a region of our great country entirely new to me, and the journey

was accordingly more enjoyable than it would have been, if I had before passed over the same roads. I was agreeably disappointed in finding the heat was not so oppressive as I expected to find it, and as I was told it would be. Even near the California and Arizona line, when we were 23 feet below the level of the sea, I was not uncomfortably warm, although I wore both my coat and duster, and the mercury in the thermometer was said to stand at 110 degrees. There was a constant breeze in the car, which was agreeable, although it was warm. If I had come about a month sooner, the trip would doubtless have been somewhat more enjoyable, but it was very pleasant as it was, and I have no hesitation in recommending it to others. But to any one contemplating taking this trip, I would recommend the same precaution that Caelebs took. He knew that the quality of the water in some parts of the journey was not of the best, and he provided himself with a mixture of sulphate of quinia and the quinine-essence of vige, usquebaugh or aquavite, which proved to be a very excellent preventive of danger from impure water and at the same time a good tonic. The result was that the physical man was about as strong and vigorous when he reached his old home at New Concord, Ohio, as he was when he left Albany, Oregon, although the trip was 4923 miles long, according to the time table.
