"More Gone Wrong."

EDITOR DEMOCRAT: Under the above heading an article appeared in last night's DEMOCRAT evidently a knock by the North Western at the Mutual Reserve.

Three officers of the Mutual Reserve are charged with having wrongfully paid \$9,000 for attorney fees for defending suits brought against them by a discharged employee. These suits were decided in favor of the Company; and the charge made against the officers is, at most, a mere technical one, or it is only a question whether the officers should have defrayed the expense of the litigation out of their own pockets or from the funds of the Company. It is evident that the dismissed employees have taken this method of getting revenge.

A crowd of "knockers," because they were not allowed to run the City of Portland, caused the indictment of Mayor George H. Williams, ex-United States attorney general, but a jury of disinterested citizens found him innocent of any wrong.
