## The O. C. & E. R. R. Co.

### To Build Along the Coast.

PORTLAND, OR. April 11.--After two years of preliminary work articles of incorporation have been filed by the Oregon Coast and Eastern Railway Company to construct 1200 miles of railroad in Oregon. The capital stock is placed at \$10,000,000 and is fully subscribed by New York and St. Louis capitalists. The right of way has been secured throughout the distance of the proposed construction, 40 men having been at work securing it and work will begin within the next four months.

The line will be built from Humboldt Bay, California, up the coast to Portland and lines constructed through central Oregon from Coos Bay to Snake river forming a junction with the coast line and probably connecting with the Moffatt road and the Chicago and Northwestern.  
The incorporators include W. J. Wiley, of Portland, John M. Eddy, of Eugene, William W. Gregory, of Portland, John H. Crabtree, St. Louis, John L. Stockwell, J. S. McIntyre, Floyd Shock, all of St. Louis, L. J. Simpson, Nor. Bend, W. J. Patterson, Baker City.

### John G. Wooley Tonight.

John G. Wooley, a former candidate for president on the prohibition ticket, will speak at the opera house tonight under the auspices of the Good Citizenship League in the interest of local opinion and against the amendment. Admission free. Mr. Wooley has spoken in Albany once or twice before, probably the ablest exponent of the temperance cause in the United States. He has just returned from a trip to Australia.

### A Saw Mill Man.

Robert Sutor, a successful saw mill promoter, is in the city. He has been here several times lately, looking over the field with a view to establishing a mill here, if satisfactory arrangements can be made and the proper site secured. Mr. Sutor has put in mills at two or three places in the state, developed into paying properties and understands the business thoroughly. Albany wants at least one saw mill, and more if possible.
