### Funeral of Dr. Thompson.

The funeral of Rev. E. J. Thompson, D. D., was held at the Presbyterian church this afternoon, at 2 o'clock, attended by a large number of friends from all parts of the valley, a splendid expression of the high esteem in which he was held.

The services at the church were in charge of Rev. Griswold, by whom a short eulogy was pronounced, also by Rev. Lee and others.

The pall bearers were F. M. Redfield, J. M. Kilstrom, F. M. French, R. K. Ohling, James Tomlinson, of this city, and J. H. Simpson of Corvallis.

The burial was in the Masonic cemetery, and was in charge of the Knights Templars, of whom he was a brother member.
