CITY COUNCIL.

Paving Resolution Passed Unanimously.

Present—the Mayor, Marshal, Street Superintendent, Chief Engineer and councilmen. Absent the recorder.

F. M. Redfield kept the record. The following bills were ordered paid: W. A. McClain, \$1.05; J. Catlin, \$4.00; B. F. Rozelle, \$3.25; Will. Valley Co., \$161.33; P. Ruestner, \$4.00; Frank Carter, \$20.00.

Upon authority of the city attorney the minutes of the last meeting were ordered signed by the city recorder instead of by W. L. Maris as read.

Report of F. M. Redfield, expert, showed accounts of city officers correct.

Petition of J. J. Graham, J. L. Hill et al, asked for an electric light at the corner of First and Baker. Referred.

A resolution providing for the pavement of First Street from Washington and Ferry. Broad and Ellis, north line of Second street, was unanimously passed.

E. H. Rhodes asked for privilege of erecting buildings on First and 2nd streets. Referred to acting city recorder.

Marshal McClain was granted privilege of being absent from Albany Wednesday night.

A resolution was passed authorizing the recorder to draw warrants for all officers on first of the month or quarter.

Recorder Thompson was granted leave of absence until he completes his work at Salem.

Mr. Pfeiffer moved that the matter of the road across the Willamette bridge be referred to the committee on public property, street superintendent, and city attorney for investigation.

Further time was granted in the matter of the proposed hydrant system.

Councilman Hand moved that the city recorder be directed to ask our senators to support the bill doing away with perpetual franchises. Carried.
