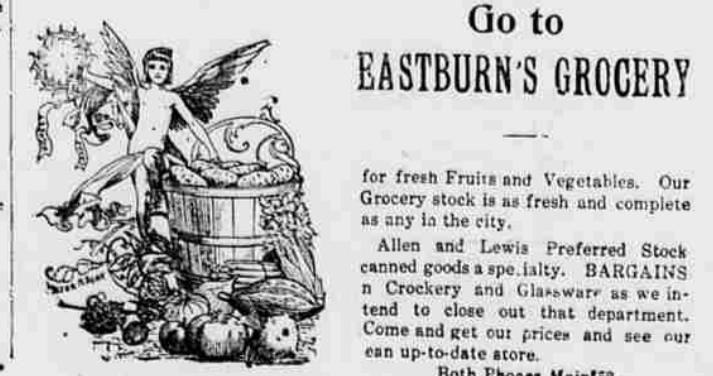

The Art of Expression.

(By Miss Mary Louise Blackwell, teacher of elocution and physical culture in Albany College.)

"The voice," said Zeno, "is the flower of beauty." Language is the condensation of all the arts of expression, for language is universal, flexible, creative, spiritual. The human voice first employed for purposes of utility to express need, desire, and purpose, is used to awaken and minister to the sense of the beautiful, and thus by tones, articulations, inflections, pauses, emphasis, rhythm, the art of elocution is developed. This art is becoming more and more recognized as a necessary and useful agency in education. When we think how constantly we use the speaking voice, we realize why it should be cultivated and why we should use expressive speech.

The natural use of the voice, proper placement of the tones, correct enunciation, emphasis, inflection, and intonation—all these are gained by the study of Elocution. The students also acquire a good style in ordinary reading and speaking, and by advanced study are enabled to interpret the more difficult forms of dramatic literature. With comparatively few lessons, persons can learn to recite interesting selections in a pleasing manner, which will be an enjoyment to their friends as well as to themselves.

For children the study of this art is indispensable, giving them ease in appearing before people, teaching them to say their little pieces correctly, and starting them on the right track to appreciate good literature, which is invaluable to them, not only in their school work, but in all phases of life.

The study of physical culture pertains more to bodily expression. The aim of this work is to acquire a symmetrical development of the body as a basis for health and grace.

One of the first things learned is correct breathing. Although they do not realize it, very few people know how to breathe properly. If they did, there would be much less lung trouble and catarrh of the head and throat.

Exercises are given to remedy the following defects: side or lateral curvature of the spine, stooping or uneven shoulders, flat or hollow chest, weak abdominal muscles, incorrect posture of the head, ungraceful or faulty carriage of the body.

The general work includes dextera, Swedish and German movement, Indian club, dumb-bell, wand, ball, poi and marching drills, flexing exercises to overcome stiffness, exercises to develop control of the muscles, and all devices in training to secure bodily action.

The results expected from the training are a dignified, but graceful bearing; habitually maintained; freedom from awkwardness and self-consciousness; ease and harmony in the movements of the body; the power of unconscious and spontaneous physical expression.

Children and young people are greatly in need of physical training under competent instruction and guidance, that their growing bodies may develop properly.

Private or class lessons in both Elocution and physical culture will be given. A class for children will be organized, which will include elocution and physical training. It is the desire of the instructor to organize a class of ladies for the study of physical culture and gymnastic work.
