The committee on fire and water recommended that the cisterns at 1st and Washington be cemented and be connected with the mains; at 1st and Montgomery be connected with main, cost \$1.00; at 4th and Washington, 4th and Ellsworth and 2nd and Baker with 3rd Street main. Adopted.

Matter of more hydrants on First street was referred to council and continued.

In the matter of teamster sleeping in engine houses, same was recommended, carried and supplies ordered.

Petition of J. H. Goin et al for grade on 1st, Harrison to Denver and Cleveland, Denver and Geary, granted.

Street Superintendent Payne reported wooden sidewalk along lot 5 block 14 H's ad by W. A. McClain properly constructed at a cost of \$30.40. Lien ordered secured.

Resignation of G. M. Payne to take effect Oct. 13 was read and accepted.

Gail S. Hill and E. D. Cusick addressed the council in reference to water in the basement of the Elks building due to a defective sewer and too much water from the Chinese hydrants. Referred to the committee on streets and public property.

Councilman Miller paid his respects to Chinatown and the block just east as eye sores and disgraces to the community.

Resolutions were passed providing for cement sidewalks along the properties of Mrs. L. H. Montanye, and Mrs. Nellie O. Baker, cement curbing along property of C. E. Wolverton on Lyon street, and a cement walk along property of R. Veal.

A wooden sidewalk having been constructed along lot 5 bl 15 H's 4th ad, a lien was ordered levied upon the property, all to be heard on Oct. 13.

An ordinance was passed providing for an sidewalks on Maple street along block 44.

Four ordinances were passed authorizing the city council to enter into a contract with the Warren Construction Co., for paving First, Ferry, Broadalbin and Ellsworth streets, work to begin within 30 days and be completed before July 1, 1909, with \$4000 bonds.

The proposed franchise in place of all the old franchises was presented on behalf of A. Welch who has bought up all the rights of H. Hersberg, and was considered by sections. A fifty years period was desired, which was objected to by the council, otherwise all the terms were satisfactory, and the council adjourned until tonight, when there will be an agreement upon this part, and work will begin on the Washington-Depot line next week.

Under the terms of the franchise the system will begin at 1st and Main streets, running thence to Eighth, thence to Montgomery, across block 6 to Baker, thence out Ninth. Also at Calapooia and Sixth to western limits; on Willamette out Lyon to depot, and on First street. Work is to be begun on the First and Lyon street line within thirty days.

The matter of freight cars is provided. Only one car at a time can be on the down street line, except after night, and cars shall not be left standing. The city is to receive \$100 a year after five years then \$200 after ten.

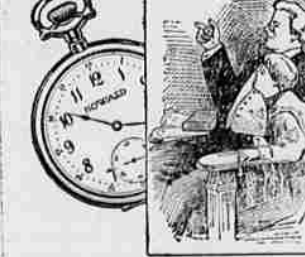
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
