Classified acco. ding to age, there are, between 5 and 9, 91 boys and 77 girls; between 9 and 12, 88 boys and 83 girls; between 12 and 14, 79 boys and 35 girls; between 14 and 20, 111 boys and 137 girls. The number of cases of tardiness is 1; publis neither absent nor tardy, 602; per cent of attendance, 97.8.

The registration at the corresponding time a year ago was 630; per cent of Superintendent Sander's report of
