Rev. A. Atwood, of Seattle, is in the city, introducing his work, The Conquerors, facts in the life and works of Rev. Jason Lee, the pioneer and founder of American institution on the Coast. It is undoubtedly a valuable historical work on the early missionary effort of this Northwest country.
