The speakers dare not tell what is in their platform. Senator Fulton in a speech mentioned the platform only twice, the injunction plank and the financial plank, which he said was not what it ought to be. It has fallen dead. The democratic platform means some-thing: the election of U. S. senators by the people, a protest against an unjust sof state and federal government are clearly defined, nolonger a paternalism; laboring men should be protected against cheap foreign labor and it presents a means for the protection of the money of the laborer when it is in the bank. These things were enlarged upon in an able manner and the campaign thunder that Bryan had been elected in 1896 on the free silver issue it would no doubt have been necessary for the Portland bankers to have chartered a special train and rushed down to Salem crying "For God's sake, Governor help us out," issuing bank certificates to help out the people.
