Literary Tendencies.

The prevailing taste in literature these days is for a product that is off color and tinged with moral instability. Booksellers cannot understand the taste as suddenly developed by the reading public and find it almost impossible to keep a stock large enough to supply the demand for books that cannot do else than poison the mind and debase the character of the reader. Books with veiled allusions and filled with the outpourings of diseased imaginations cannot be considered fit for the young men and women of our nation to read. We need a public censor of the newly published books and many of the editions and issues would then be so expurgated that nothing would remain save the covers.

Scarcely any of the so called popular books can or will survive for a year. It seems that we are fast aping the French style and cultivating a like appetite for the novel and reading that deals with the inconsistencies and moral unreliability of its characters. It would be much better if writers would devote more time to lauding and showing the good and true in the characters of fiction rather than magnify the low and debasing side of the human family. A stop should be called and parents would do well to carefully watch and study the reading matter allowed their growing children.

Fruit Inspector Necessary.

The action of the county court in dispensing with the county fruit inspector is to be lamented and is most inopportune. All over the state we are known as a city and county ambitious of becoming the fruit and especially the apple center of the Willamette valley. After encouraging apple fairs and meetings for the promotion of horticulture, the court takes a backward step and makes it possible for all the work of the past few years to be undone. The horticultural possibilities of the valley are its greatest resources and should not be neglected. More value will be added to the lands of this county through a high state of inspection and horticultural excellence than from any other possible source. Let us have a competent inspector and wage even more relentless war against all forms of pest and destroying insect than ever before and through careful attention to every detail of proper cultivation of the orchard positively eclipse all the excellence of previous years.
