TO-NIGHT.

Lincoln J. Carter's play of heart interest and titled "Too Proud to Beg" will be the attraction at the Albany Opera House, Wednesday, Nov. 25th. The play is said to be well constructed on the lines of an intricate and clever detective story, and it is promised that there is no lack of interest throughout the four acts. In this play, Mr. Carter has endeavored to demonstrate to the public that he need not rely on stage carpenter or scenic artist exclusively for the success of his play. It is that in "Too Proud to Beg," he has written a comedy drama, that for directness of theme, terseness of dialogue, cleverness of situation and legitimate dramatic merit, it compares favorably with many more pretentious plays. The two principal characters of the piece are the children; of the persecuted hero. The first act is laid in the office of the police inspector, where the villainous plans are concocted. The last scene of this act warehouse on fire and the rescue of the hero by his little son. The second act discloses the interior of the dive which is the rendezvous of the home of the police inspector and the capture of the gang. The cast presenting this play is a rare one numerically and very capable. Special attention should be given to the bright children who play very important roles.
