## ATTORNEY FINCH A MURDERER.

Kills Attorney Ralph Fisher of  
Portland Today.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 28.—Attorney  
James A. Finch of Portland shot and  
killed Attorney Ralph Fisher in Port-  
land at 1.30 today. Disbarment pro-  
ceedings had been prosecuted by Fisher  
against Finch and recently the Supreme  
Court of the State of Oregon issued a  
mandate disbaring Attorney Finch for a  
period of one year. The charge was  
"appearing in Court in a drunken con-  
dition."

Fisher was a member of the grievance  
committee of the Oregon Bar Asso-  
ciation and appointed prosecutor in  
all matters pertaining to conduct of  
lawyers. Finch was formerly from Al-  
bany. He has been arrested and lodged  
in jail. He denies that he shot Fisher.
