News From Albany's Six Early Trains.

President Kerr and Prof. Withycombe, of the O. A. C., left to attend a session of the Country Life Commission, organized under the direction of President Roosevelt, to meet in Portland this week. The movement for the development of the country life idea is a splendid one, and prominent men do well to promote it.
