Near Beer Ordinance Passed, with Emergency Clause.

Adjourned session Tuesday evening, Dec. 29. Present:-Mayor, Recorder, Chief of Police and Councilmon Tomlinson, Mil-ler, Dawson and Hand.

Petition of W. A. Sharp and others for a sewer was granted.

The ordinance providing for a right of way across Jackson street, near the rruit cannery, for a track by the Al-bany Preserving Co., after amendment, was passed

The matter of a sewer to the proper-ty of C. A. Gray and others was dis-cussed, reconsidered and referred to the committee on health and police.

A new ordinance prohibiting the sale or giving away of near beer, spirituous wines or malt liquors not intoxicating, was read three times and passed unanimosity. The penalty is \$50 to \$100 or 25 to 50 days imprisonment. Each sale constitutes a separate offense.
