### THE NEW GAME LAW.

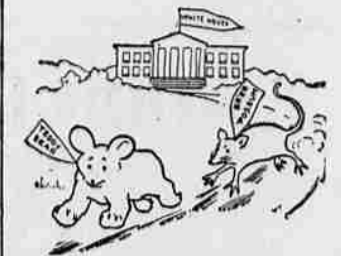
Beaver—Closed until 1920. Buck deer—Open July 15 to November 1. Limit three deer. Sale prohibited. No hunting with dogs. Elk—Closed until September 14, 1914. Spotted fawn, antelope and mountain sheep—Closed perpetually. Ducks—Open September 1 to March 1. Limit 50 birds a week. Geese and swan—Open season October 1 to March 1. Chinese pheasant—Closed until October 1, 1911. Grouse, native pheasant, ruffed grouse or partridge—Open October 1 to December 1. Limit 10 birds a day or 20 per week. Prairie chicken—Open September 15 to November 15. Limit 10 birds a day or 20 per week. Quail—Open October 1 to December 1. Limit 10 a day or 20 a week. Trout—Open for hook and line fishing only. April 1 to November 1. Sale prohibited. Limit 75 trout in one day. Bass—Unlawful to catch with other than hook and line.
