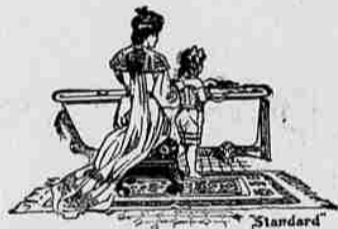

# HISTORY.

An address in the regular course of the Bible School of special interest to Oregonians was that of Prof. Senator last night at the M. E. church on The Largest Aspect of Oregon History.

He said the world is moved by men of imagination, and showed how this was true of the early history of Oregon. In 1744 Arthur Dobbs, an Englishman published a book on the progress of British expansion, resulting in an attempt of Great Britain to secure the whole of this Northwest country for her own use; but there was another man of great imagination, Thos. Jefferson, who wanted it for the United States, and the foundation was laid to retain it; but the fact that it was kept for this country when the great contest to make the Northwest boundary line along the Columbia occurred was due to the pioneers themselves, the real force being the pioneer. In this connection he showed how the men who have been frontiersmen in this country have been frontiersmen in the days of Jefferson, Washington, Marshall, Calhoun, Webster, Clay and Lincoln.

A man who played an important part in early Oregon history was John Jacob Astor, the tradesman. Previous to the address the Gilbert sisters were heard in several selections, splendid singers who promise to be heard from in the concert world.

Prof. Sherwood today closed his very instructive lessons on the life of Paul. Rev. Chas. A. Phipps is now giving lessons on S. S. work, of great value.

This afternoon Rev. Robert McLean, of Grants Pass is to be heard on evolution as taught in our schools.

Tonight at the M. E. church Rev. Jeannette Ferris, of Sheridan will give an address on Bonny Scotland in song and story, something no one can afford to miss.

## Alter Fruit Land.
