## HACKLEMAN PROPERTY DIVIDED.

The report of the referees Surveyor Fisher, W. H. Goltra and Worth Huston, in the suit for the partition of the large Hackleman estate, of A. and Elenor Hackleman, was filed today, showing the following division:  
Nora Williams—2.83 acres H's 2nd ad, 36 acres, Lebanon road, 160 acres 11-3 W, 12.90 acres and 51 lots Albany.  
Pauline Price—179 acres 11 3 W, 6.31 acres, 12.10 acres, 13.97 acres suburbs Albany, and 155 acres in country.  
T. P. Hackleman—10.38 acres, block 8 H's 4th ad and 100 acres 11-4 W.  
Denver D. Hackleman—1.54 acres, 8.71 acres, 12 acres, 18.41 acres, 1 1/2 lots in and near Albany, 185 acres Oak Creek, and 2 lots Waterloo.  
Frank Hackleman—16.90 acres, 26.89 acres suburbs and city, and 121.09 acres country.  
The referees estimated each at approximately the same value, a total of \$100,000 or more.  
It seems there is dissatisfaction and two other committees have put estimates on the property: one, Mrs. Williams \$20,937, D. D. Hackleman \$25,920, T. P. Hackleman \$19,528. Mrs. Price \$16,902, Frank Hackleman \$17,412. Total \$99,697. The other, Mrs. Williams \$25,327, D. D. Hackleman \$26,863, Mrs. Price \$21,699, Frank Hackleman \$11,447, T. P. Hackleman \$23,314. Total \$119,650. It is said there will be a contest.
