DEATH OF MRS. HUGHES, At Almost 91, A Pioneer of 1847.

Mrs. Sarah A. Anderson Hughes died at 7 o'clock this morning, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. D. Sloan, of old age, and Albany loses a good citizen, a resident of the city and vicinity for sixty-two years, leaving a splendid record as a wife, mother and neighbor.

She was born near Beardstown, Ky., Dec. 7, 1818, and moved with her folks to Illinois when three years of age. She was married to Geo. H. Hughes, at Carthage, Ill., May 12, 1839, from which place they moved to Carlinville, Ill., in 1844, where they resided three years when they crossed the plains in 1847, taking up a claim just beyond the Calapooia, where Mr. Hughes died a few years ago, and Mrs. Hughes has since resided with her children in the city.

Twelve children were born, of whom three survive, Mrs. Emily, E. Sloan, Mr. Geo. W. Hughes, and Mr. E. L. Hughes, all of and near this city. Besides she leaves eleven grand children, three great grand children, two great great grand children, and one sister, the latter nearly her age, in the east.

She was a member of the Congregational church for many years.

The funeral service will be held at the residence of Mrs. Sloan, at 418 W. 2nd street on Friday at 2 p. m.
