PRACTICAL TRAINING NEEDED

People's Popular Monthly: Only about one-third of those entering the public schools ever finish the work in the grades and probably less than half of those finishing the grades enter high school. Less than one-sixth of those entering high school complete the course. The average school life of the American boy is four years, and this comes before the age of twelve. The reason for this condition is not altogether poverty. It is broader than this. It is found in the fact that the courses provided in the schools do not appeal to the average boy as being useful. He wants to learn something that will help in the struggle for existence and he does not understand how the work in the grades will do this. What is needed is more practical work, in other words, industrial training. A boy ought to be taught to do things as well as receiving the instruction contained in books.

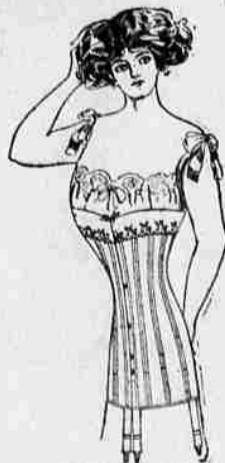
