A GREAT MINE

Another Rich Strike Reported.

A report of a second rich strike in the Mexican mines owned by Linn county people comes through the Guanajuato Gazette of the 29th, which says: "During the week the work in the La Bonita, which is in charge of E. G. De Witt contractor, and Charles Cummings general manager of the Mexican Mines, Ltd., ran into ore assaying 25 grams gold and 1,625 kilos silver to the ton. It is reported there is quite a large tonnage of this in sight."

Dr. J. L. Hill, of Albany, Or., president of the Mexican Mines Company, is expected in town today. The board of directors met in Albany January 15 and Dr. Hill left immediately for Mexico.

Dr. Hill has not yet started for Mexico, though urged to go as early as possible. Business interests here have required his attention and an epidemic of la gripp in Mexico made it inadvisable for the doctor to go earlier. The great strike just made will call the president and one or more of the directors to be on the ground within two or three weeks to make arrangements for the disposition of the ore taken out.

Dr. Hill has received a private letter from a mining expert whom he sent to inspect and report on the condition of the mine. The expert writes "Your mine is developing to be worth millions. It is one among the greatest in this camp."
