THE GET TOGETHER MEETING

The Lebanon excursion to Albany yesterday evening was a surprise, and an agreeable one. Four cars were filled, one hundred ninety-two people coming down. They were met at the depot by a crowd of Albany people, a procession formed, and the pavement taken to the commercial rooms, where the key to the city was turned over to them. The Feeless Band, a good one, furnished music for the occasion.

In the evening the commercial club rooms were packed to the door, and a get together spirit prevailed that was striking. The Lebanon and Albany yells were given and with President Davis in the chair one of the most enthusiastic programs ever presented in Albany was heard.

Senator F. J. Miller gave the address of welcome, the band played, Booster Geo. A. Waggoner spoke in response for the Strawberry Brigade.

A telegram was read from the premier booster, Tom Richardson, in which he said: "Albany and Lebanon, Linn county towns, will prosper in unity."

The high school Glee Club of Lebanon sang and were encored, the appropriate tune being "Keep a Goin'". M. A. Miller made a talk that took, full of get together.

Judge Duncan whooped up the good roads proposition.

With Postmaster Van Winkle as the teacher a class of Albany men had a primer lesson, that captured the house, a regular booster for Lebanon and Linn county, with some individual hits.

Then the tenderfeet were given a chance, and they showed the mettle that counts. H. N. Bouley and Geo. H. Crowell, of this city, and E. B. Day and E. L. Clark, of Lebanon, made some splendid talks, boosting the Willamette Valley.

C. E. Sox spoke, the Glee Club sang, and then Sam Garland, N. M. Newport, Mayor A. M. Reeves and Postmaster W. M. Brown were called upon and made things hum. 52 per cent increase in the business of the Lebanon postoffice in a year speaks for the town.

Figures given showed that around Lebanon is more good fruit land than around Hood River, and some day it will be just as good a fruit raising center.

The enthusiasm was great, and never before has there been such a spirit of get together and stay there as now in Linn county.

The Albany chorus sang their booster songs, Dick Churchill served a fine lunch of punch, sandwiches and cakes and a free and easy spirit prevailed, with plenty of noise. But back of it all was a serious strain of boost and business that means much for Old Lion.

No. 16 arrived at 6:30 and No. 14 was half an hour late.

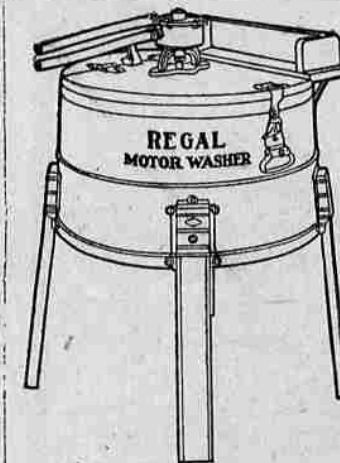
Conductor Elmer Dannals, of the Hoover train reported snow two feet deep on the level, a decidedly white prospect.
