DAVID FROMAN

David Froman, one of Albany's best known pioneer citizens, died last night, just before 12 o'clock, of old age.

He was born Sept. 7. 1821, in Durbin County, Ind., going from there with his folks to Illianois in 1830. He was married Aug. 12, 1841 to Nancey A. Hen derson, with whom he lived for over sixty years. They had no children. Mrs. Parrish was an adopted daughter. In 1851 he came to Jregon, taking up a 320 acre claim near this city, selling it in 1859 and moving to Albany, residing at 817 W 7th street from that date to his death. Mrs. Froman died a few years ago.

He was one of Albany's first Masons, a past grand master and a member of the grand lodge. He was elected marshal in 1869, councilman in 1874 and Mayor in 1875, filling both the latter offices afterwards.

He was a man of integrity, a good neighbor and citizen.

The funeral will be at the family residence tomorrow afternoon at 2 p. m.
