It is said that in Portland the price of strawberries was kept up to 12 1/2 cents a box through an organized combination of the dealers, though some of the berries were shipped into the city for as low as six boxes for a quarter, the lowest price that prevailed here. That is not treating the people right. Poor people cannot afford to eat many berries at 12 1/2c, nor put them up at that price. Albany has the cleanest lot of retailers in the U. 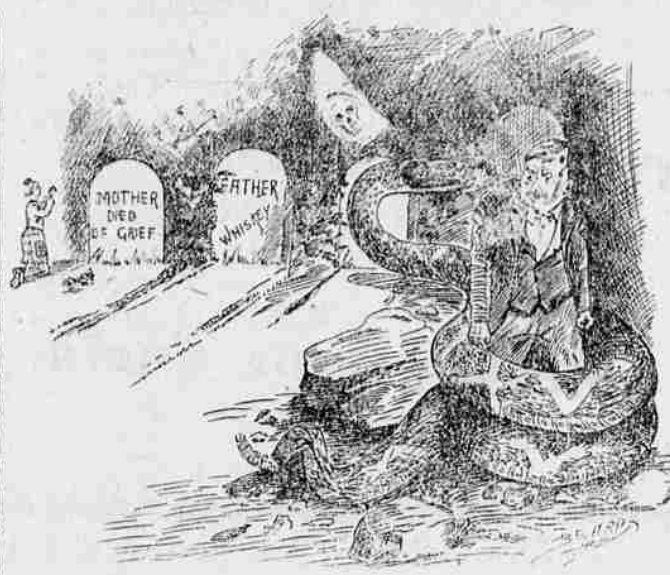
