There is the greatest interest centering in the county offices, all of which are to be filled with the exception of assessor, surveyor, school superintendent and County Judge. This leaves the field open for candidates who sapire to the offices of sheriff, county clerk, treasurer, recorder and commissioner. So far the principal telk has centered around Bert Templeton, of Brownsville, and Grant Lindey, of Lebanon, for the Republicans to choose for the position of sheriff, while the Democrats have been talking of the present incumbent, D. S. Smith; ex sheriff Worth Huston, Glen Junkin and F. C. Stellmacher. The latter has also been mentioned in connection with the candidacy for county clerk. He has had much experience in the two offices named, having served four years as chief deputy in the clerk's office and two as chief deputy in the sheriff's office. He has a wide acquaintance throughout the county, made possible through his years of service in a public cabacity. For clerk, the choice of the Republicans will probably be Willard L. Marks, present chief deputy under County Clerk J. W. Miller. He has held this office for the two years of Mr. Miller's incumbency.

For county recorder, the present incumbent, Grant Froman, is aspiring to succeed himself for a third term. No opposition has appeared from the Democratic side but this may develop later. For treasurer, w. W. Francis, present treasurer, is desirous of succeeding himself, and will probably be unopposed in his party for the primary indorsement. As to the position of county commissioner there is no one mentioned in either of the two parties.

There seems to be no interest in this county at all over the legislative positions to be filled this fall.
