COL. HOOPER FOR GOVERNOR.

Col. Hooper publishes a picture of himself, and gives the kind of man the people of Oregon should select for governor of Oregon, declaring such a man to be "a republican who will curb the extravagances of the legislature, even if composed of a majority of his own party, by use of the veto power, and who will not ratify the jobs of a log-rolling majority—a governor of the people, by the people and for the people." Col. Hooper was once a member of the state legislature. After the session the Salem Statesman published the standing of the members with the appropriations they voted for, and, lo, the name of Col. Hooper led all the rest, standing at the top, with the highest figures of all after it, the record showing that he had voted for everything presented, many graft measures turned down by the average legislator. This is a matter of fact else the Statesman prevaricated, and it was not denied at the time. The Col. boldly appeals for the whiskey vote and that of anti-Christians, declaring against prohibition and Sunday legislation. He declares in favor of the grangers and legislation for them, but will he fool many grangers; he declares for free locks, but he will not fool the merchants of the valley. He stands right on the assembly and statement number one, on free locks and in favor of the development of Oregon; but that is easy. Perhaps this is none of the business of a democratic paper, but it is a part of the political doings of the day.

THE PEOPLE WILL RULE, NOT THE BOSSES.

W. S. Duniway as state printer has saved the people of Oregon about \$40,000, and as an official has done good work. He is the logical candidate of his party for renomination, and as he remained out of the convention of the bosses will no doubt get it at the hands of his party, materially assisted by the fight the Oregonian will make for the assembly nominee, Mr. Clark, a good fellow, but in the wrong company to get votes. All over the state there will be such an emphatic expression against the assembly as to be heard. This will particularly be true in the country districts, where the farmers are united against the assembly. They want no dictation by Harvey Scott and the other political bosses of Oregon, nor will they brook it. The law provides a different method for making nominations, and those who seek to subvert it will hear a loud voice when the primaries come off.

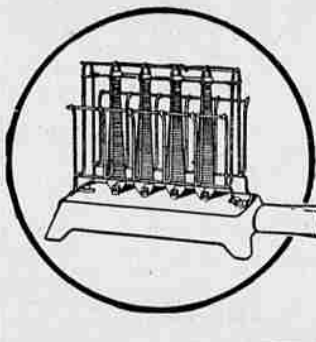
