"I hereby announce myself a candidate for congress, subject to the will of the Republican voters of the First Congressional District of Oregon at the coming primary election. counties since the state assembly of July 21, this year, together with the evident general demand for some candidate to represent the principles I hereinafter announce, impel me to this.

If nominated and elected to congress, I will not vote for Joseph Cannon for Speaker of the House and, to the end that legislative power may not be concentrated in the hands of a few men, I will vote to take away from the speaker the appointment of the rules committee and all other committees and return it to the hause, whence it originated.

I shall vote to give the Interstate Commerce Commission power to regulate railroad rates upon the basis of the value of the physical property of the railroads and to give the commission power and authority to limit the issuance of stocks and bonds of railways to actual investments made.

I will vote for a revision of the tariff with the interests of the mass of consumers constantly in the foreground and shall insist that, on all trust manufactured articles the revision be downward until the tariff schedule shall cover the difference in the actual cost of production in the United States and foreign countries only, as was promised by the last National Republican platform.
