SURVEYORS ARE CLAMS

Junctio Times.—Another surveying crew unloaded their baggage here Thursday morning and at once commenced preparations for work. The crew consists of 14 men, all from San Francisco, under charge of C. P. Goertl of New York. Office headquarters have been secured in the Al Johnson annex and the necessary teams at the livery stable. Arrangements and engagements are made for three weeks.

The head men decline to talk. One of the men said they were S. P. surveyors and would first run a line to Monroe. Some are of the opinion that the line from Corvallis will be built, but that line was surveyed and right of way deeded 25 years ago.

Some are of the opinion that they are here in the interest of Hill. Others claim that they represent the San Francisco Electric company and will run a survey to the coast either via Lake Creek or Elmira. These facts are given for what they are worth. The manager said they were on a secret mission and then shut up like a clam.

ARRIVED FROM PANAMA

Mr. Frank Patterson arrived in Albany this noon on the Shasta, from Panama, joining his wife, Mrs. Eva Patterson, of the Hamilton store, and children. He came to San Francisco by steamer, the trip not agreeing with him, and he was somewhat ill upon arrival. The hot Panama weather offered a striking contrast to our cool climate. Mr. Patterson was with the government for fourteen months, a resident of Panama for almost two years. The government is pushing the work on the canal and expects to have boats going through in 1914. The best advertised Oregon section on the Canal Zone is Roseburg, which has done special work down there.

BUILDING 3 COTTAGES

Mr. George Strine has begun the erection of three two story cottages on his property at the corner of Ellsworth and Fourth street, he bought recently of R. B.
