That Transmission Line.

Guard—The Northwestern Corporation has a crew of surveyors at work between Eugene and Albany surveying for the transmission line which it is proposed to run from the big power plant now being constructed at Martin's Rapids, on the McKenzie River, to several towns down the valley. Eugene, Springfield, Junction City, Harrisburg, Albany, Corvallis, Independence, Mouth and Dallas are among the places to be supplied with electricity from this plant. The surveyors are now camped at Coberg, the little sawmill city, six miles north of Eugene.

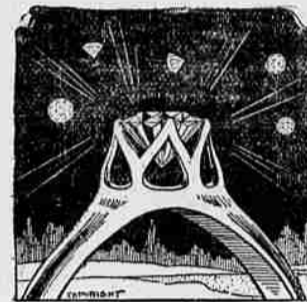
