EX-GOV. GEER  
DOWN IN  
ARIZONA.

The Democrat has received from a friend at Phoenix, Ariz., a copy of the Arizona Republican of Sept. 6, containing an account of a speech by Ex-Governor Geer, of Oregon, in which he attacks the Oregon system, a mass of slanders from beginning to end. He says: "By reason of having loaded itself up during the past few years with a choice assortment of political idiosyncracies, impractical vagaries, impossible governmental stunts, haphazard populist nightmares and a complete job lot of other crazy quilt half-baked isms Oregon has frequently been termed the fool of the family of states." Instead Oregon's initiative and referendum, which is referred to, has given Oregon a standing as the most progressive state in the Union, and everywhere other states are copying the Oregon system.

He says: "The time was when Oregon was a perfectly sane state." Sure, Mike, and never more so than when the voters dropped T. T. Geer from its list of office holders.

A democratic paper at Phoenix published a dispatch from Senator Chamberlain denouncing Geer as a machine politician, the server of corporations, defeated himself by the Oregon plan, and the tall Ex-Governor made a sorry mess trying to explain matters.

He charged the initiative to be a direct attack on representative government, etc. the same old stuff, and gave his audience numerous advices of how to proceed along common sense lines.
