## MR. GEER'S GREAT INFLUENCE.

The people of Oregon generally will appreciate the splendid influence Ex-Governor Geer has just had down in Arizona in helping to carry the new state for the democrats. But for him it is not certain that the state would have given the splendid democratic majority it has rolled up. Had it occurred in Oregon the influence would have been appreciated because he is known here, where he was put down and out through the power of the order of things. It was supposed that down that way, a thousand miles or more, they would not have gotten under the power of his magnetic presence; but it seems that he had been heard of, and the people were ready for the onslaught.

But seriously, the result in Arizona speaks for the tendency of the times, a breaking away from the administration of misrule that has been going on in the United States for several years. Because the country has been prosperous, a fact due to industrial conditions, the administration has imposed on tax payers through a regime of trust supremacy and graft. Now a tired feeling has come over the masses and they have begun to speak out. The demagoguery of such men as Ex-Governor Geer is not going to stem the tide. In fact it is quite likely that Mr. Geer really has a back-acting influence against his own contentions. The situation is an interesting one.

## DON'T HITCH.

No matter what a candidate may claim the man who is on an assembly ticket is an enemy of the direct primary law. They don't hitch any more than a dog and a cat. The real object of the assembly or convention system is to do away with the primary law. Of course as the primary law is in force the assembly candidate has to profess friendship for it in order to get votes. But the whole assembly business is enmity to the plan of the direct primary as plain as the nose on an hippopotamus.

## DOWN PORTLAND WAY.

For the building of free mains through speculative tracts for twenty years the people of Portland who use water paid out over three million of dollars. Then this racket was stopped. It was such a good thing, however, that an attempt is to be made to return to it. One estate in Portland has a tract of about 450 acres to which it wants laid over \$100,000 worth of water mains, which will be laid free as a sort of Christmas present from the dear people next winter if the proposed amendment to the city charter passes.
