DEMOCRATIC PROSPECTS.

St. Louis, Sept. 23.—Addressing the Democratic Editorial association of Missouri tonight, Champ Clark minority leader in the national house, said circumstances at the present time presage democratic victory this fall. He said that for the year past democratic prospects have been growing brighter until at present the democratic party seems on the eve of a sweeping victory. "We want to win such a victory this fall as will put hope into every democratic heart and make the elections this fall and two years hence duplicates of the elections of 1890 and 1892." He asserted in the case of democratic success, the program would certainly be to reduce the tariff to a revenue basis, increase trade by means of reciprocity agreements, abolish superfluous offices, cut appropriations to the needs of the government economically administered, and restore the merchant marine to its ancient commanding position on the high seas and submit a constitutional amendment providing for the election of United States senators by popular vote.

New Rates.

The advantage of being on the river is shown in the freight rates under the new schedules. The first class from Portland to Albany is 28 cents, at Eugene 46 cents, Roseburg 72, Medford 118, Ashland 123, some difference. Albany gets a reduction of 1 cent on third, fourth and A classes, 2 on fifth and C classes, 3 on B, D and E classes. The latter is now the lowest 7 cents per hundred.

A Good Trip Anyway.

Lebanon E. A. Glen Wallace, who received an appointment to the naval school at Annapolis and left for that city last March, returned to Lebanon Tuesday night, having failed to pass the examination. Glen says there were about 300 appointments to take the examination, over 200 of them failed, many among the latter class being college graduates. Glen had an enjoyable trip, having visited Washington, D. C., and many other large eastern cities.

A Family Reunion.

All of the family of Mrs. A. B. Kelley, of Thomas, this week, had a reunion, the first time they have been together for twenty nine years, an enjoyable event, bringing together the mother and six children from their different homes in the Northwest: Mrs. M. J. Queener of Stayton, Mrs. Maud Moore of Grants Pass; J. H. and W. R. Kelley, of Post, Crook county, C. W. Kelley of Albany, and Mrs. Anna Holt, of Thomas, at whose house the reunion was held.

THE CALAPOOIA TRIP.

Fifteen automobiles have already been lined up for the excursion of the Albany Commercial Club up the Calapooia valley next Wednesday, and others are being enlisted. The trip promises to be the biggest thing of the kind ever pulled off in this part of the Willamette valley. Several ladies have signified their intention of joining the excursion, and a number of autoists are making up private parties to accompany the junket. The committee of arrangements has prepared a registr list which is open at the Commercial Club rooms. Every member of the Commercial Club intending to go on the trip should call and register or phone his name to the Commercial Club. The charge for the trip is \$2.50 to defray expenses of automobiles.

At Holley the "Sage of the Calapooia," R. R. McKinney, assisted by the citizens of that vicinity, is making extensive preparations for the big noon "feed" which will be given the excursionists at that point.

Arrangements were made yesterday for a short stop at the lumber mills of the Calapooia Lumber Company, near Crawfordsville, where opportunity will be given the party to inspect the plant. All the tows on the line have been notified of the time of arrival and all say they will be ready to receive the travelers in fitting style.

The Primaries

The primaries were in progress at press time, with all manner of speculation as to the result. If indications count there will be a big insurgent showing. Bowerman will probably be nominated for governor by the republicans, because of the split against him, but with far from a majority, and Oswald West by the Democrats. For congress the uncertainty is emphatic. Some close races were expected in the county.
