All water bills are delinquent after the 15th of the month.

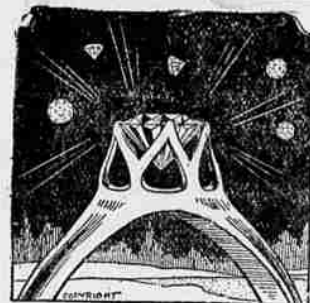
Electric Consumers—You will receive on the first of each month a post card giving the amount of electric current used during a given time and the amount charged for the same.

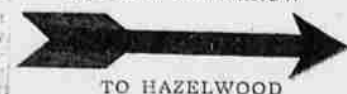
