FATAL AUTO ACCIDENT.

Portland, Oct. 14.—In a collision between a street car and her automobile, Dr. Edna D. Timms, a well known physician of this city, was almost instantly killed tonight. Her chauffeur was painfully but not dangerously injured. The car struck the automobile at the intersection of Nineteenth and Flanders street and the force of the impact was so great that the machine was hurled nearly fifty feet, and Dr. Timms' body several feet farther. Motorman Rayburn and Conductor Miller of the street car were arrested on a charge of manslaughter, but later were released on their own recognizance.

Good Meetings.

The democratic candidates are having good meetings on their tour of the county. At Brownsville the audience was a good one and the best of attention was given each candidate. At Holly they met a large crowd of voters. At Sweet Home they had an old fashioned democratic meeting, the crowd being large and full of enthusiasm. Fair sized audiences met them at Waterloo and Sodaville. The most pronounced sentiment at all these meetings among democrats and republicans alike is opposition to assemblyism and assembly candidates. There is a disposition shown among anti assembly republicans and democrats to vote for anti-assembly candidates. For that reason democrats will vote for T. B. Kay, anti-assembly republican, for state treasurer, Mr. Bingham anti-assembly republican, candidate for joint senator for Linn and Lane counties, and for Moore and McBride for supreme judges. Anti-assembly republicans in large numbers will vote for West for governor and Slater and King for supreme judges. There is much independence among the voters.

THE EMPIRE TONIGHT.

"The U. S. Submarine 'Salmon'."—The largest submarine in the world, being 178 feet in length and of about 370 tons displacement. She is equipped with port and starboard gasoline engines of 8 cylinder type, capable of developing 200 horse-power each. The film shows the "Salmon" at close range, running on surface, submerging by water ballast, making "porpoise" dives, and running submerged so far that only the tops of the periscopes are visible. Taken from an accompanying boat in a fairly rough sea, the effect is thrilling, besides giving one a good idea of what "Uncle Sam" is doing in the navy yards.

Pres. Crooks, delighted with the action, at once started for the east to raise the money. There are wealthy Presbyterians in Oregon who ought to give that much alone, and perhaps the eastern people will say so.

The action is very pleasing after a long delay of over forty years, in which a beggarly support has been given the college. The synod ordered \$2500 raised at once for general expenses.
