## DOUBLED IN 5 YEARS.

During the campaign of 1905 it was said that if Albany went dry it would kill the city. Did it? The banks of a city are a pretty good index of the business of the city. The actual increase in the resources of the banks of Albany since January 1, 1906, when the saloon went out, has been \$1,086,138.70, an increase of 100 per cent. The absence of the saloon hasn't done it all, but it has helped.

It would help the entire state just the same. Money in the saloon is absolute waste.

Besides the banks the receipts of the post office have nearly doubled and business conditions generally are twice as good.
