White and Messrs. Hamilton and Schmitt, with good audiences. The farmers are wide awake to the situation and nearly solid for the cause of temperance. They are upon this Home Rule proposition, with eyes wide open, and see through the great game being played to make the cities the tools of the breweries and liquor dealers.

The Registration

The registrations for this year at the close of the 15th, are only 4254, which is 303 less than two years ago. Fully 1500 voters have not registered. They are divided as follows: republicans 2250, democrats 1487, socialists 180, independent 151, prohibition 109, miscellaneous 77. South Lebanon leads in the total with 363, East Albany being next with 278. The new precinct of Calapooia has 97 and Knox Butte 125. Kingston has the least 41.
