Mr. Beatty, republican nominee for senator, was an assembly delegate, Mr. Bean was nominated by the assembly for joint senator and Mr. Train has come out in favor of the assembly in the Oregonian. In the next legislature an effort will undoubtedly be made to make such a body legal, and the voters should see that the majority stand right on the subject. In the last legislature the effort was made in House bill No. 344, which passed that body, but was defeated in the senate by a vote of 17 to 12. If this bill is passed the people will referendum it and kill it by a vote of 6 to 1."

Statement number one was passed by the people by a majority of over 48,000 and Linn county should see that no one is elected to the legislature who straddles the fence on any subject.
