The fire statistics of New York show, I am told, that 80 per cent of the fires are attributable to carelessness in use of matches in lighting cingars and cigarettes. A store of mine was twice burned through this agency. In building operations I have found it dangerous to employ either contractors or carpenters who are addicted to this vice.

Tobacco seems to undermine the memory till the workmen are unable to execute proposed schemes to satisfaction. I never employ men who drink. I find the most successful method to stamp out either of these hydra-headed evils is through commercialism, simply employ no person who fools with them.
