ABOUT TOBACCO.

Editor Democrat: On a postcard recently I made a remark about the stupendous evil of the tobacco habit. Among a few of the maladies traceable to the weed is infantile paralysis, but wishing to be correct I will say that infantile paralysis has not been scientifically investigated and is still held in a congestive state. There is little doubt however in the minds of thoughtful observers, who have much evidence on which to base an opinion, that this destructive disease finds its origin in tobacco. Individual inquiry has developed the fact that one or more of the parents of each child attacked, and also their forebears, have made mistaken use of tobacco in some form or other. It seems a reasonable conclusion to reach since tobacco is now known to be a nerve depressant. First it seems to stimulate, but becomes a depressant when not backed by more. Like the fiendish drug, ever calling for more. Dr. Fowler, the noted parenologist, said it so poisoned the system of man as to render him absolutely unfit for contact with pure womanhood, that this fact was constantly asserting itself in ovarian tumors and uterine cancers, filling the hospital with women demanding surgical attention. Sometimes it misses a generation to be revisited upon the following. While it is less assertive than more insidious in its approach than liquor, and I earnestly believe, produces a greater percentage of imbecility and insanity. Statistics show liquor the greatest of asylum fillers, but I doubt if they consider the fact that most tobacco fiends use liquor and eventually when that fails to satisfy they try narcotics. From early life I have condemned the use of both evils, and any other agency which lowers the standard of humanity. I always feel that the odor of both is thoroughly repulsive; but of the two tobacco worries me more because it is constantly in evidence and so aggressive. The fire statistics of New York show, I am told, that 80 per cent of the fires are attributable to carelessness in use of matches in lighting cigars and cigarettes. A store of mine was twice burned through this agency. In building operations I have found it dangerous to employ either contractors or carpenters who are addicted to this vice. Tobacco seems to undermine the memory till the workmen are unable to execute proposed schemes to satisfaction. I never employ men who drink. I find the most successful method to stamp out either of these hydra-headed evils is through commercialism, simply employ no person who foils with them. Christ told us to present our bodies a living sacrifice wholly acceptable to God. Also, "Be ye perfect as your heavenly father is perfect."

Bend is now electric lighted. Multnomah and Willamette are playing foot ball at Salem this afternoon. A big union evangelist meeting will begin in Eugene Nov. 22 under Evangelist Stough. Woodrow Wilson, the new governor of New Jersey, is a coming man. Keep your eyes on Wilson. Governor Benson yesterday resumed the governorship, and Mr. Bowerman is again just president of the senate.

Capt. M. D. Phillips, of Oregon City, formerly of this city, is a candidate for the Oregon City post office, and is making a live campaign for the office. A 625 foot block is being erected in New York. It will be 46 stories and will cost \$7,000,000. It will start with a 100 foot swimming pool in the basement. Rev. Matlock, of Medford, in a sermon Sunday night charged that newspaper men are a spineless bunch. Some are, some are not, likewise some ministers both ways, and come other people.

May Starve. Cordova, Nov. 15.—Eighty-three persons, comprising the passengers and crew of the wrecked steamship Portland, which was beached in the mouth of Katala river Saturday, are stranded on Katala island. The storm which broke soon after the passengers landed from the wrecked vessel is raging with increased fury and all efforts to go to the aid of the marooned passengers proved unsuccessful.
