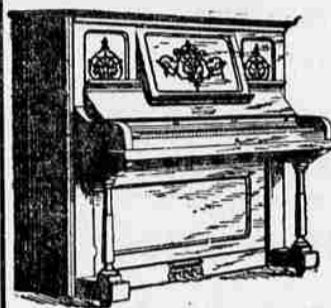

### ARMORY DEDICATION

May Be Jan 6. A Big Event.

General Finzer and Architect Martin of the O. N. G. were in Albany this week returning trains inspecting the armory, with which they are greatly pleased, and arrangements were begun for the dedication of it, with Jan. 6 suggested for the date. It is proposed to have it an affair of the people, open to everybody, presented in a popular form, under the direction of the Albany Commercial Club, and the matter will be discussed at the get-together meeting Monday night. An effort is also being made to have the annual meeting of the O. N. G. officers of Oregon, consisting of a body of nearly one hundred officers, held here at that time, so that the members may be present at the dedication, an important one, being the first under the new law, in the sense.

The people of Albany are justly proud of the armory, a fine structure, and are thoroughly interested in its dedication.

#### State Y. M. C. A.

The Y. M. C. A., of Oregon and Idaho, met yesterday at Eugene with a good attendance. The reports showed 7,238 members in the two states. In the absence of the president, Prof. A. C. Schmitt of this city, presided. New officers were elected, R. A. Booth being chosen president, Fletcher Homan vice president, J. O. Russell of Portland secretary, and Fred M. Weatherford of the O. A. C., assistant.

The principal speakers yesterday were Secretary Stone of Portland, E. L. Shuey of the international committee, R. A. Booth and Dr. Foulkes. Prof. Schmitt spent this forenoon in Albany returning to the convention this afternoon. He reports it a great success. The address of Dr. Foulkes last night was a strong one, making a great impression on the large audience. The reports of the different branches of the work showed improvement and prosperity along all lines of the work.
