The stock books of the U. S. Rubber Co., one of the most colossal trusts of the country, show that Senator Aldrich has three hundred shares in it. It is easy to see what kind of service the U. S. has been receiving from Aldrich, and in whose interest he has been working. And Aldrich is only one of quite a number of trust magnates who have been running the government. Legislation for years has been emphatically in the interest of the big concerns, and the enormous wealth they have accumulated is due in a great measure to favorable legislation. The trust is the people have been benefited, and Senator Aldrich has been the steerer. It is as plain as the trunk of an elephant. Recently the people broke away from such rule, and made a demand for something else. It should be granted. More than that, there should be a law making it impossible for a member of a trust concern to occupy a seat in congress.
