### DIANA

Interested Many Albany People.

There was a very large audience at the M. E. church last night to see and hear Diana McNeil, the adopted child of Lizzie McNeil, a former Albany teacher, on her way to Chicago to train for work back in her native country, Liberia. Her career is an interesting one, showing what Christian culture will do. Picked up, almost wild, by Miss McNeil she has developed into a splendid character, though as black as it is possible for a person to be, and excites interest wherever she is. J. S. Van Winkle made the introductory speech, telling of the childhood of Miss McNeil, out in the country, not far from his own home, and her life of sacrifice for a great cause, leaving the story of Diana for herself, which she told, in excellent language, simply and impressively: the bigness of Africa and its resources, her own native home, the advent of Miss McNeil, and the gradual hold of her Christian life upon the natives, among others herself. Now she will go back herself into the dark continent, and help to bring light and good cheer to her people, steeped in ignorance, first taking a two years' special training course in Chicago, giving her life for others.

### DOINGS OF THE WORLD

The state press association met in Portland yesterday, a strong factor in the progress of Oregon.

The state legislature will meet on Monday. So far all there has been to it are the fights for the presidency and the speakership.

At Charleston, S. C., yesterday Jimmy White, an 18 year old boy made a daring airplane flight and got \$5,000. The boy promises to die young.

Last night the Eugene high school defeated Roseburg 48 to 24. This means that Albany will have a hot game when Eugene meets the quintet.

Only eleven out of several hundred editors attended the press association at Portland, from outside of Newport. This included Mathews of Newport, always on hand, and Hofer of Salem.

The Salem high school and Fall City high last night debated the question of restriction of immigration by the educational test, Fall City winning. The Salem team that went to Corvallis, though, won, taking the negative.
