WANT GOOD ROADS.

The judges and county commissioners of Oregon have been holding a convention in Portland considering matters in connection with the important business of their offices. That of roads has taken the lead, deservedly so. It is a big one, and hence there is a difference of opinion. One man wants all the five bills of the Good Roads Association railroad through, just because they are good roads bills. Another one believes a conservative course should be taken.

As a rule judges and commissioners are practical men, and what they are after is a system of roads leading into business centers, built by the state and counties jointly under some plan that shall be the least burdensome. Most farmers are not in favor of a big bonding system, one that leaves a mortgage on the counties for years; but rather in a pay-as-you-go system, with a liberal appropriation for improvements.

OREGON OR KANSAS.

A Kansas man after being out in Oregon and taking a side squint returned to that state and made the remark that he would not trade twenty acres of Kansas land for a hundred in Oregon. Well Oregon is full of men, including the writer, who would not trade twenty acres of Oregon soil for a hundred acres of Kansas land, and in fact several times that if he had to live on it. In short, the writer considers this Willamette Valley about the best place in the world, from all stand-points. On the other hand there are so many good qualities about the country it would take a volume to tell them. CORVALLIS' NEW HOTEL.

The Corvallis Gazette-Times devotes a whole page to the new Hotel Julian of that city, and it no doubt deserves the space. It is a big thing for a city to have an up-to-date hotel with all the modern conveniences demanded by the public. It cost \$45,000, has 96 rooms, all provided with steam heat, hot and cold water and telephones. Eighteen rooms have bath and toilet, spacious ones. Besides each floor has a public bath and toilet, and the basement is also provided with them. There is a parlor on each floor, opposite the elevator, an electric concern, running whenever needed. The dining room is 30 by 60, with an auxiliary half as big. The ceilings are sheet steel. The lobby is a pretty one, with tiled floor and a modern office. In fact everything about this new hotel is reported to be all

right. Julian McFadden did it all himself, furnishing Corvallis with a four-story hotel that is a credit to him and the city. The Democrat takes pleasure in speaking a good word for it, and will take greater pleasure in noting as good and large a building down in the business center of Albany.

We have a new one out by the depot, not so large, but just as modern in every respect, and it is pleasing to learn that the rooms are being occupied by travelers wishing the very latest in conveniences.
