DOINGS OF THE WORLD

Dr. Cook in a lecture in New York last night insisted that he reached the north pole.

LEGISLATURE VERY SLOW.

Fourteen bills passed the senate yesterday. One was a third road bill, one compels railroad agents to post corrected bulletins of trains, one provides for extension of boundaries of cities, Barrett's county bonding bill for good roads, prohibiting the sale of liquor within six miles of public works, defining vagrancy and fixing the penalty.

The house passed eight bills. Among them, Miller of Linn changing from July to January the time for the treasurer to make annual statement, Buchanan abolishing the whipping post, providing for fiscal agent for Oregon in New York.

Eleven new bills were filed in the senate, among them: establishing ages for children to work, vesting the legal title of the Cascade wagon road grant.

Fifteen new bills were introduced in the house, among them: Brooke, amending irrigation laws. Chambers, for the protection of lobster. Limiting wagon tires to 2 1/2 inches minimum.

Forbidding driving automobiles by any one under 18.

Rackleff, requiring payment by cities to counties of \$400 for each saloon license.

Abbott, creating state board of accountancy.

\$14,517 for street improvements of O. A. C.

Abbott, creating state industrial accident commission.

Next week will be musical week for Albany and the college. There will be recitals by conservatory students, free to all, on three nights, and on Friday night the sixth and best number in the lecture course, "The Grand Opera Sextette," at the opera house.

It was decided to place wholesale houses that sell direct to consumers on the black list. A good many of them do this to hotels and such establishments.
