### CHAUTAUQUA AUDITORIUM ORDERED.

The Chautauqua board met last night at the Club rooms, when complete plans were shown for a new auditorium, a permanent structure, for the Chautauqua, already solidly established. The construction of the building was ordered, and a committee of five appointed by Chairman Ellis to raise the money for the purpose. It will be 189 by 100 feet, with the roof above high water and movable sides, with a seating capacity of 3,000 or 4,000. It will be situated down where the driveway was last year, closer and more convenient.

Further time was granted the committee on lease. Mrs. Brown reported some proposed ladies work.  
Another session of the board will be held this evening.
