LEGISLATURE.

Senator Miller yesterday gave the
state printer a live slap in an effort to
secure the flat salary system for the
office. He declared the office was pay-
ing entirely too much, more in a year
than the governor receives in four
years.

The general appropriation bill as
recommended calls for \$1,019,965.49,
but this is only a part of the appropri-
ations that will be made.

A good many bills were passed during
the day, among them:

By Senator Miller, providing for a
complete drainage system.

Merryman, protecting wild geese.

Clemens, protecting secret societies,
both houses.

Libby, preventing white slave prac-
tice, both houses.

Buchanan, appropriation for National
Guards for fighting fires, both houses.

\$5,000 to fight the bubonic plague,
both houses.

And many bills fixing salaries of
county and other officers.

Bills monkeying with the recall law,
and preventing frauds at primaries
were indefinitely postponed.

Several new local bills were intro-
duced.

A resolution to submit the woman
suffrage question again passed the sen-
ate 16 to 12 Miller and Bean voted
yes.

The eight hour bill of Dimick was
defeated in the senate.

A resolution by Thompson calls for a
joint committee of investigation of
State Food Commissioner Bailey.

Sending and Receiving Messages.

The Western Union announces an ar-
rangement by which the Pacific Tele-
phone subscribers may receive and send
messages over their telephones.

This saves a visit to the telephone
office. It includes night service. If
the local telegraph office is closed, as
most are in smaller places, a distant
office that keeps open all night is called
up and the message taken and sent.
Messages will be received under the
same arrangement.
