Hon. J. M. Philpot arrived from Priceboro, on the Springfield road. The Misses Powell came down from Brownsville.

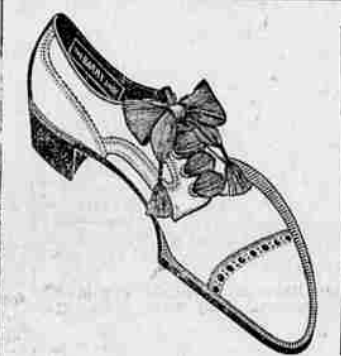
