ON PAVING

Committee of Kalispell Aldermen
Favors Bitulithic Pavement.

Kalispell, Mont., March 4.—Bitulithic
pavement appeared to be the one most
favored by the committee of the city
council, which reported Monday night,
after a trip that extended over Wash-
ington and parts of Oregon and Idaho
and occupied more than two weeks.
The committee reported on cement
blocks, wood blocks, vitrified brick,
asphalt, bitulithic and several other
mixtures similar to it. They declared
that the best pavements they found
were those in Portland, where bitulithic
was used for the heaviest traffic, and
that the poorest pavement was asphalt.
They said that on the day they visited
Spokane several horses were injured
by slipping on the wet asphaltum and
had to be shot, although this, they
said, was the best asphalt pavement
they saw anywhere. It is not decided
yet which pavement will be laid as bids
have not been asked, and the contract
will be conditioned upon the figures to
be submitted. The paving is to begin
early this spring and is to cover the
business section.
